Access to Sciots Recreation Residence Tract near Strawberry on the south side of Highway 50,					
Allows Recreation Residence Permit Holders to assess for damage, winterize water systems, secure cabins, and complete previously approved maintenance. Day use only.					
4. CONDITIONS OF USE					
a. Authorized uses are subject to all the permit terms and conditions on page 2.					
b. The following additional conditions of use apply: Permit Holders are entering an active fire area. Some hazards have been mitigated but many still remain. It is the responsibility of permit holders to be aware of increased risk in the area including but not limited to fire weakened trees, limbs, and tree tops, active fire, damaged septic tank lids, rolling material and rocks, burning stumps, ash, other hazardous materials, and ongoing fire suppression activities. Obtaining and using personal protective equipment is the responsibility of the Permit Holder. If the Permit Holder does not assess their permit area to be safe, it is their responsibility to leave the area.

1. This permit shall expire on the last date shown in Block 2. This permit shall not be extended or renewed.
2. This permit is for use only by the holder or the holder's authorized representatives listed in block 2 of the corresponding application when they are acting within the scope of their delegated authority. This permit is not assignable or transferable.
3. There is no fee for this permit.

4. This permit is a federal license that constitutes written authorization for the holder to be on National Forest System roads, on National Forest System trails, or in areas on National Forest System lands that are closed or restricted by regulation or order. This permit does not constitute a contract or lease for purposes of the Contract Disputes Act, 41 U.S.C. 601; does not convey any interest in real property; and may not be used as collateral for a loan.

This permit is a federal license that constitutes written authorization for motor vehicle use by the holder on undesignated National Forest System roads, undesignated National Forest System trails, or in undesignated areas on National Forest System lands per 36 CFR 212.61(a)(8) and 261.43(h). This permit does not constitute a contract or lease for purposes of the Contract Disputes Act, 41 U.S.C. 601; does not convey any interest in real property; and may not be used as collateral for a loan.~~

5. This permit is subject to all valid outstanding rights.
6. The use authorized by this permit is not exclusive. The Forest Service reserves the right to use the roads, trails, and areas authorized by this permit and to allow others to use them at any time. The holder shall use the roads, trails, and areas authorized by this permit in a manner that will not unreasonably or unnecessarily interfere with their use by others, including the Forest Service.
7. A copy of this permit shall be carried in all motor vehicles operated under this permit. When vehicles are parked in restricted areas, a copy of this permit shall be displayed on the dashboard. When a parked motor vehicle does not have a dashboard, a note shall be left on the parked vehicle and the permit copy locked in a vehicle compartment or carried in the operator's possession. This permit shall be presented upon request to any Forest Service officer.
8. Unless specifically authorized by attachments to this permit, the holder shall not reconstruct or maintain routes, plow snow, post signs, erect closure devices, or otherwise restrict use of routes by other authorized traffic.
9. In exercising the privileges granted by this permit, the holder shall comply with all present and future federal laws and regulations and all present and future state, county, and municipal laws, regulations, and other legal requirements, including state traffic laws, that apply to the permit area, to the extent they do not conflict with federal law, regulation, or policy.
10. The holder assumes all risk of loss associated with use of the roads authorized by this permit, including theft, vandalism, fire and any fire-fighting activities (including prescribed burns), avalanches, rising waters, winds, falling limbs or trees, and acts of nature.
11. The holder shall be liable for all injury, loss, or damage, including but not limited to the value of resources damaged or destroyed, the costs of restoration, cleanup, or other mitigation, and fire suppression or other types of abatement costs, associated with the use and occupancy authorized by this permit.
12. The holder shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the United States for any costs, damages, claims, liabilities, and judgments arising from past, present, and future acts or omissions of the holder in connection with use of the roads authorized by this permit. The responsible official may prescribe terms that allow the holder to replace, repair, restore, or otherwise undertake necessary curative actions to mitigate damages in addition to or as an alternative to monetary indemnification.
13. The holder shall have in force motor vehicle insurance covering losses associated with the use authorized by this permit in at least the minimum amounts prescribed by law for operating motor vehicles on public roads in the State.
14. The responsible official may suspend or revoke this permit in whole or in part for noncompliance with federal, state, or local law; noncompliance with the terms of this permit; or abandonment or other failure of the holder to exercise the privileges granted. Prior to revocation or suspension, other than immediate suspension under clause 15, the responsible official shall give the holder written notice of the grounds for revocation or suspension and a reasonable time, typically not to exceed 7 days, to cure any noncompliance. Revocation or suspension of this permit shall not give rise to any claim for damages by the holder against the Forest Service.
15. The responsible official may immediately suspend this permit in whole or in part when necessary to protect public health or safety or the environment. The suspension decision shall be in writing.
16. The holder and the responsible official shall keep each other informed of current mailing addresses.
17. No member of or delegate to Congress or Resident Commissioner shall benefit from this permit either directly or indirectly, except to the extent the authorized use provides a general benefit to a corporation.
18. If there is a conflict between any of the preceding printed clauses and any clauses contained in attachments to this permit, the preceding printed clauses shall control.

THIS PERMIT IS ACCEPTED SUBJECT TO ALL ITS TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

HEALTH AND SAFETY PRECAUTIONS FOR RE-ENTRY AND DEBRIS REMOVAL AFTER FIRE

If you visit your property to collect belongings and mementos, please familiarize yourself with the information in this packet. It contains important details about the hazards of entering a fire-impacted area. **Property owners should not clean-up of their destroyed structures until approved to do so by El Dorado County Environmental Management. Doing so may preclude you from future government assistance.**

BURN AREA CONDITIONS

- In the burn area, you will encounter dangerous conditions and may be exposed to toxic materials, and physical hazards that may include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - Power lines or wires must be treated as energized as they have the potential to cause serious injury, or death
 - Embers & hot ash
 - Hazardous materials such as ash, asbestos, heavy metals, oils, fire retardants, pesticides, and other hazardous materials
 - Puncture hazards such as broken pipes, exposed nails, broken glass, and damaged structural elements
 - Potential explosive hazards such as propane tanks, ammunition, and solvents
 - Slippery surfaces
 - Toxic airborne particles
 - Unstable structures

DEBRIS AND HAZARDOUS WASTE

- Fire damage can create significant health and safety hazards that may be present at individual properties. ***It is recommended to not disturb structure ash due to potential exposure to toxic materials.*** If you choose to visit your property, please consider the following:
 - Wear gloves, long-sleeved shirts, and long pants to avoid skin contact, whenever possible. Goggles should be worn. Contact with wet ash may cause chemical burns or irritation on skin. Change your shoes and clothing prior to leaving the decontamination site, to avoid tracking ash into your car, home, etc.
 - Wear sturdy shoes (steel toes and shanks are recommended).
 - Hazardous chemicals and conditions may be present.
 - Inspect propane tanks for visible damage before turning on, and check for leaks using a soap solution.
 - Anything in contact with ash should be cleaned and sanitized. ***Sorting through/cleaning fire debris is not recommended.***
 - Be aware of slip, trip, fall, puncture, and overhead hazards.
 - Do not use leaf blowers or do any activities that will put ash into the air.
 - Wear a close fitting respirator mask that is rated N-95 or P-100 to block particles from ash or smoke from being inhaled. N-95 respirators can be well-fitted when they do not come into contact with facial hair; the strap tension is adequate, but not overly tightened; and masks fit across tightly at the nose bridge. A tight seal may not be possible for children, even with a small adult-size model. People with heart or lung disease should consult their physician before using a respirator.
 - The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) is the only agency that certifies respirators to determine that they adequately protect people. Look for NIOSH approval on the package or label.

DO NOT REMOVE ASH AND DEBRIS

The county is working with various state and federal partners to establish a process for the assessment and removal of household hazardous waste and asbestos, as well as structural ash and debris from the fire. This process will be announced to the public upon its completion.

FOOD SAFETY

Some or all of the affected fire areas have not had power since the fire started. Refrigerated food is considered unsafe after a power loss of four (4) or more hours and should be discarded. If you have dry/canned foods that were damaged by heat or water at your home or property, they should be discarded.

- Never taste food to determine safety. You can't rely on appearance or odor to determine food safety.
- If your refrigerator has been non-operational for an extended period of time, the food inside is unsafe.
- Once your refrigerator has been emptied, clean the inside with soap and water, rinse with clean water, then sanitize with water and bleach (1 Tablespoon of bleach per gallon of water).

WATER SAFETY

If you are served by a public water system, contact your water service provider for information regarding water safety. If your home or business lost water pressure at any point, water available from your tap should be considered unsafe.

- Commercially bottled water should be used for consumption and oral hygiene purposes until your water provider confirms a safe and potable water supply.
- Once your water supply is confirmed to be safe and potable, all water lines serving your home or business should be thoroughly flushed.
- If you are served by a private well, refer to the *Disinfection of Wells & Water Systems* handout at www.edcgov.us/Government/emd/environmentalhealth/pages/water_well_disinfection.aspx
- If your well has been damaged by fire or physical contact, it may expose the well water to contamination if not repaired properly. Fire can damage the well casing, electrical conduits and piping. **DO NOT** use the water from a damaged well for consumption which includes drinking, cooking, dishwashing, oral hygiene, hand washing, bathing and pets.
- If damaged, the well must be repaired by a qualified professional, disinfected, purged of disinfectant (bleach) and then tested to determine the water is safe for consumption.
- Qualified professionals include licensed well drillers, pump contractors and/or certified distribution operators. Water sample analysis should be conducted by a CA certified laboratory. SEPTIC SYSTEMS

- Fire could have damaged your septic system. The damage would have most likely occurred to the piping between the house and the septic tank, from the septic tank to the leach field, or the plastic septic tank lids and risers (if any). Damage can occur from heavy equipment such as backhoes and bulldozers used to fight the fire or to clean up debris. Repairs to the system must be completed by qualified professionals as per Environmental Management Department's requirements.
